Souvenirs / Remembrances presents monumental works from two renowned artists from St. Catharines, Ontario, Carolyn Wren and Tobey C. Anderson.

For War Map Dress Trilogy, Carolyn Wren was inspired by the ingenuity of Christopher Clayton Hutton, who, during World War II, created silk maps for the British Royal Air Force. The pilots were given these military maps, which showed the layout of the land to facilitate their movements and ensure their safety. Lightweight and durable, these objects were easy to conceal. After the war, Hutton's ingenuity and the scarcity of silk inspired women to be creative as well: they collected the silk maps and made dresses out of them.

To create *War Map Dress*, Carolyn Wren redrew the map in the shapes of her patterns, carved these into pieces of linoleum, then hand-printed them onto Dupont silk. With this printed fabric, the artist made 3 ninefoot *map dresses*. When viewed in this manner, waterways look like intestines, roads resemble veins or arteries, and the print image becomes a map of the body. Surrounded by models of World War II bombers and fighter aircraft, these *map dresses* create the theatrical space conducive to the recollection of the soldiers' journeys and the anxiety of their loved ones. We find ourselves in the middle of an experiment on the borderline between the territories of the land and those of the mind.

The exhibition will run from January 12 to February 14, 2011.

Tobey C. Anderson presents The New American Century Project, whose title is derived from the Washington-based neo-conservative think tank *Project for The New American Century*.

In the «KIA_CA_Afghanistan» series from *The New American Century Project*, the artist has painted 154 Canadian soldiers who have died in Afghanistan since 2005. Also from *The New American Century Project*, in his series «Collateral Damage» he as painted 72 civilians who are casualties of the Iraq war.

While we are distanced and detached from the realities of warfare and natural disasters we view daily in the media, we are more connected to the most horrific of global events on a minute-by-minute basis than ever before. The use of the grid, the colour selection and the application of fluorescent paints that glow under UV lights reference the digital medium from which the images were taken. The dimly lit installation creates an eerie effect of anonymous death and brings the emotional subject matter back to the original, personal sense of the painting medium.
